Join Us - Two Oceans Aquarium Waddles for the love of African penguins on African Penguin Awareness Day!

START This Saturday, 14 October 2023, the Two Oceans Aquarium, in support of the #NOOW African Penguin Campaign, invites Capetonians and visitors alike to join a Penguin Waddle. Help shine a light on International African Penguin Awareness Day and show care for the well-being of South Africa's marine environment and its special inhabitants, the African penguin.

"This global initiative will see Waddles taking over cities in five continents with Waddles taking place from the USA to France, South Africa, Mozambique and Japan. All of South Africa's major cities are hosting big Waddles for International African Penguin Awareness Day" said Helen Lockhart, Conservation and Sustainability Manager at the Two Oceans Aquarium.

In Cape Town, the Two Oceans Aquarium will proudly be leading a Waddle through the iconic V&A Waterfront. Following a surge of interest, the Two Oceans Aquarium will be supporting an additional Waddle in association with Marine Dynamics and I Am Water, from Simon's Town to Boulders Beach – the home of about 9% of the African penguin population.

African penguin on the brink of extinction

The aim of the Waddle is to raise awareness around the plight of African penguins and their rapid decline in numbers. African penguins are the only penguin species found on the African continent. In the last century, their numbers have declined dramatically, and current estimates suggest that there are a mere ~10 000 breeding pairs in the wild today. Scientists estimate that if their numbers continue to decline at the current rate, these charismatic and endemic birds will be functionally extinct in the wild within 15 to 20 years.

The #NOOW African penguin Campaign

The #NotOnOurWatch campaign's worldwide waddle on 14 October 2023 has been endorsed by the <u>United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development as a Decade Activity.</u>

#NOOW was created in 2022 after scientists and conservationists agreed there needed to be a public action project to try to stop the functional extinction of the unique African penguin by 2035. The campaign's goal is to create a movement and raise awareness about the need for urgent action to reverse the decline of the African penguin population in the wild. Public support in South Africa and around the world, including in the USA, Europe, Japan and Australia, will help to ensure that the South African government, the conservation community and private industry make wise decisions concerning the future of the African penguin.

"While many people and organisations are dedicated to the survival of the African penguin and their incredible commitment and hard work must be commended, saving a species needs action on the ground, the support of people and actionable legislation. To date there has not been a public action campaign for the African penguin. This is where #NOOW comes in" said Dr Judy Mann, Head of Strategic Projects at the Two Oceans Aquarium Foundation.
